Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

Question	Stats:	Further context Relative to local challenges
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	90%	At Norbridge Academy, we pride ourselves on providing children in KS2 with a term and a half of swimming lessons. These allow children to develop their swimming competence and confidence in the sport.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	90%	Many children in our Year 6 cohort can swim a range of strokes. The 10% who cannot are able to swim at least 25 metres but do not do so confidently and therefore struggle to use a range of strokes.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	90%	All confident and proficient swimmers are able to perform safe self-rescue.
